Eleni M – How Art Changed the World



Using the Sparxreader programme for their home learning, our students have engaged in 11,105 hours of careful reading, completed 3,877 books, answered 785,786 comprehension questions and read 89,084,846 words.

New developments

In response to feedback by students and teachers, Sparxreader have made improvements to the process by which your young people can choose their reading matter.

Firstly, they can indicate their preferred genre which means their selection of four books is more personalised and relevant. Furthermore, students are now



able to sample the book before committing to read it. Finally, students are encouraged to leave reviews of their reading matter, because sharing is caring.

GCSE students and Sparxreader

Excitingly, at the beginning of the summer term, we were selected to take part in a pilot programme which gave our students access to their GCSE English Literature texts on the Sparxreader platform. Year 10 flew with this, rereading A Christmas Carol independently to improve their foundational understanding of the novella. Teachers were, in real time, able to view the accuracy of their KS4 students' comprehension. This insight is potentially transformative for our interventions early in Year 11.

"It is actually really helpful," one year 10 student grudgingly acknowledged.

Although there is no set homework over the summer holidays, the Sparx platform will still be accessible to continue reading current books. Team English highly encourage all students to delve into reading for pleasure over the holidays- reading is the key to success!





July 2025

It has been a fantastic year in Maths, and we are so proud of the hard work, determination, and progress our students have shown. From problem-solving to algebraic reasoning, it has been wonderful to see them challenge themselves and grow in confidence as mathematicians.

In June, we said a fond farewell to our Year 11s. They remained focused, resilient, and determined until their final exam, and we are confident they will achieve brilliant results in August. It was a joy to see them celebrate at their Prom and river cruise — a fitting end to their time with us.

Celebrating Maths Success: Star Pupil Awards

This year, we are proud to recognise five exceptional students who have gone above and beyond in their maths homework. Our Star Pupil Award is given to one student in each year group – those who have achieved the highest number of Sparx XP points over the academic year.

Congratulations to our 2024–25 Star Pupils: Ama H, Oliver H, Emilia D, Darcey M, and Yulia M.

These students have shown incredible commitment, resilience, and drive, completing hundreds of questions and dedicating countless hours to their independent study. They are an inspiration to their peers and a credit to our school community.

Across all year groups this year, our students have:
Answered a staggering **1,681,440** questions correctly
Completed over **13,495** hours of personalised maths practice
Addressed more than **123,252** misconceptions through targeted videos

Sparx Maths doesn't just support our curriculum – it powers progress. Weekly homework strengthens classroom learning, feeds directly into assessments, and helps students fill gaps in their knowledge. We continue to recognise those who top the XP leaderboard each week, and those who complete their homework by Tuesday earn a House Point for their team.

To every student who logged on, persevered, and gave their best – well done. And to those wondering if they could be next year's Star Pupil: the journey starts now.

On the note of homework, we'd like to remind all students that anyone who struggles to complete their Sparx tasks at home is welcome to attend support sessions in Room 17, where a maths teacher is available every lunchtime to help.

Year 8 Students Achieve Silver Success at Surrey Maths Challenge

Congratulations to our talented Year 8 students, who secured **second place** at the Surrey University Team Maths Challenge, held recently at the University of Surrey.

The competition brought together schools from across Surrey, with teams taking part in a series of challenging mathematical rounds designed to test problem-solving, teamwork, and reasoning. Throughout the day, our students impressed with their focus, determination, and creative thinking across four demanding rounds:

- Group Round: Solving as many questions as possible within a time limit
- **Crossnumber Round**: Tackling a mathematical crossword puzzle in pairs, requiring precise calculation and communication
- **Shuttle Round:** Solving linked questions in a fast-paced, high-pressure environment
- **Relay Round:** Racing to solve problems in pairs, passing the baton to teammates for the next question

Despite strong competition, their hard work and teamwork paid off, earning them an impressive second place overall. This event encouraged students to apply their maths knowledge in new ways, fostering a love of problem-solving beyond the classroom.

Well done to our brilliant team on this fantastic achievement.

Impressive Results in the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge

We are delighted to celebrate the fantastic achievements of our Year 7 and 8 students in this year's **UKMT Junior Maths Challenge**, a prestigious national competition that encourages students to apply their skills to a variety of challenging problems.

This summer term, our students showcased their problem-solving abilities and mathematical reasoning, earning some outstanding results:

- **9 Gold Certificates** (scores of 91 or higher)
- **19 Silver Certificates** (scores of 73 or higher)
- **28 Bronze Certificates** (scores of 54 or higher)

These results place many of our students among the top young mathematicians in the country.

Year 9 Students Impress in National Edge Hill University Mathematics Challenge

We are proud to share the achievements of our Year 9 students who took part in the **Edge Hill University Mathematics Challenge**, a national competition encouraging creative problem-solving, teamwork, and mathematical thinking. In Stage 1, students tackled a complex problem and presented their solution in a creative and eye-catching format. Their teamwork and originality impressed the judging panel, earning them a place in Stage 2, where they solved another challenging problem, this time making clear use of computer technology to aid their solution.

Although the team narrowly missed out on a place in the Grand Final, progressing to Stage 2 of such a competitive national contest is a tremendous accomplishment.

The competition aims to:

- Make maths fun, engaging, and accessible
- Encourage collaboration and teamwork
- Promote problem-solving and communication skills
- Inspire creativity and the use of technology within mathematics

Congratulations to our students for their excellent efforts and for representing the school so positively – we look forward to seeing them continue to thrive in future mathematical challenges.

Students Crack the Code in School's Easter Egg Maths Hunt

The end of the spring term saw our school buzzing with excitement as students took part in our special **Maths Easter Egg Hunt**.

Organised by the Maths Department, the hunt took students on an adventure around the school building, solving mathematical puzzles and clues to find their next destination. Hidden in each room was a colourful Easter egg containing a letter. Once all letters were collected, students unscrambled them into an Easter-themed anagram to win a chocolatey prize.

The event was a huge success, with students working together to solve problems ranging from number patterns to logic puzzles — all while having fun and improving their problem-solving skills.

It was a wonderful way to end the term, leaving students with smiles on their faces and chocolate in their hands!

Science Department News

Year 11

We are exceptionally proud of the work that our Year 11 students have put in over the whole year. We are impressed with their dedication up until the end of their GCSEs with great attendance and effort towards the end when they were having full or half days of science. We are sure that all this hard work will pay off and look forward to celebrating with them in August.

Sparx Science

Our students have answered an amazing 1,072,219 questions correctly this academic year and spent over 12,500 hours on their Sparx Science homework. These impressive numbers reflect the students' hard work and commitment to learning. Extra congratulations go to our Star Pupils for this year of Ryan S (Y11), Ellie B (Y10), Monty B (Y9), Tom S (Y8) and Elodie P (Y7) for the effort they have put into their science homework and who have been awarded their Sparx Stars Badges.

Physics Olympiad

A number of year groups have taken part in British Physics Olympiad Competitions and the number of certificates achieved was impressive.

Some Year 11s participated in the rather challenging Intermediate Physics Challenge at the end of their Spring PPEs. Congratulations to Luca G for being awarded gold.

Our Year 10 Triple scientists took part in the Junior Physics Challenge Online and all were awarded at least a Bronze certificate with special congratulations to Amy W who achieved gold.

A number of Year 7 students took part in the Year7/8 Physics Online Challenge and all were awarded at least a Bronze certificate. Extra congratulations go to Hugo B, Kai B, Niamh B, Sienna BS, Tallulah B, Jack D, Eva G, Marlowe G, Ollie G, Edgar H, Simona I, Edward L, Sophie L, Violet L, William P, Emily R, Etienne S, Poyraz Y who were all awarded gold.

ACG Science Trips

Charterhouse's Biology department welcomed Year 7 ACG students earlier this term

"We went to Charterhouse to take part in a science workshop. We were adding chemicals to foods to find out if they contained protein, fat, sugar and carbohydrates. Next we had 4 mystery liquids and we had to figure out which of these they contained. Overall this was extremely fun and interesting and I would do it again"

Charterhouse's Physics department had a visit from Year 8 ACG

"We did a practical timing how fast a cart would go down a ramp depending on how much weight was pulling it. We also did a practical timing how fast a cart went down a slope at different angles. We filmed the cart and used light sensors."

Charterhouse's Chemistry department welcomed Year 9 ACG

"We learnt about molecular bonding and balancing equations through a variety of fun practicals. From looking at the separation of crude oil to showing the colour change of liquid and the reaction times of a flame, the day was incredibly fun and educational."

Beyond Science Club

Our KS3 students have been participating in Beyond Science Club, where they took part in a wide range of fun experiments such as making rainbow paper and chromatography flowers; investigating water pressure; designing and producing a working waterwheel; designing grabbers and going on a bug hunt round the school grounds.

We will be back in the Autumn term for more fun practicals and STEM activities for Year 7 & 8 after school on a Thursday.


Further congratulations must go to our outgoing year 11s who we hope are enjoying their well-deserved summer break already. We wait with great anticipation for their outcome of their hard work!

In addition, our students have engaged superbly in opportunities outside of school that we have been able to offer this year. Firstly, we returned to Poland with year 10 over the Easter holidays. We travelled to Krakow where students explored the Jewish quarter, the site of the ghetto, museums, the salt mines and were given a talk by the daughter of someone who helped her friend escape the

Holocaust. Most significantly, our students were able to visit the notorious Auschwitz-Birkenau camp. The students were met with horrific some tales of heroism and suffering and have come away to consider the Holocaust in a more informed light.







Broadwater also played host to Gloria Silver who kindly came to share her father's experience of the Holocaust. He escaped the Nazis several times and in different ways; first by jumping off a train heading towards a camp and secondly by travelling from Finland to Sweden by skiing across the frozen sea. We wholeheartedly thank Gloria for sharing her father's unique story with our year 9 and 10 students.



Year 9- Personal Identity projects






GCSE Graphics- Year 10

Year 9 Art


Our year 9 groups have been working on their Under the sea project. They have been learning about wet felting and using the technique to make jellyfish.

This term in year 8 we have approached Frantic Assembly's physical theatre workshop focusing on the script 'The curious incident of the dog in the nighttime.' Students have understood physical vocabulary, push hands, chair duets and round-by-through to use in a performance. We have also introduced devising for a target audience from a stimulus. The students have had a choice of stimuli to create a devised piece of drama from using research, drama techniques learnt this year and theatrical skills. The students have researched a range of themes through the choice of stimuli that was offered. Stimuli: Unpretty by TLC, 'Look Up' video about the use of mobile phones, a poem about prejudice and a video around the effects of bullying. These have spurred the students into finding facts and statistics and engaged them into telling their own stories. Some fantastic drama was created. The use of sound and lighting was used throughout, students had the opportunity to become actors, directors, devisers, lighting technicians, sound designers and script writers







YEAR 9 Drama

Year 9 have had a very physical term focusing on their skills in platform theatre and exploring the techniques of 'Frantic Assembly'. Having completed the 'Box House theatre company's workshop back in March they've used their skills to re-create fairytales in the style of Platform theatre. Each group worked incredibly hard to produce outstanding examples of theatre. Some of which I will be putting up on our drama page website. Having performed in this style I thought it was only fitting to continue with the physicality, and so I introduced year 9 to the techniques of Frantic Assembly. Some of which we cover in year 8, so we recapped chair duets, but then they had a go at 'flying', 'Push hands', 'hymns hands', Lifts and 'phone numbers. The students were then able to create their own physical theatre motif at the end of term; some wonderful pieces were devised with a range of techniques used. For some year 9 students this was their final drama performance, and we can confidently say they smashed it. Year 9 worked incredibly hard this year and produced incredible performances. We wish them luck with their GCSE options, and we are looking forward to having 2 GCSE drama classes for next year.


















YEAR 10 Drama

Year 10 have been creating and developing their GCSE component 2 devised pieces ready to perform in September. They have developed the pieces from a range of stimuli and researched themes and topics. The style of the performance is verbatim focusing on the influence of the practitioner 'The Paper Birds.' The students have explored a range of inventive and creative ways to deliver the production using Frantic Assembly's 'Round, by, through' and lifts to elevate key moments within the production. The students have also been working on their devising logs which is 30% of the overall GCSE grade. The students participated in a Box House theatre devising workshop for the day showcasing their devising skills and being guided by some fantastic techniques to support the GCSE.





Year 10 also had a visit from Godalming College first year performing arts company to perform their touring production of THE IT by VIVIENNE FRANZMAN. This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to see a devised piece of theatre using a range of physical theatre techniques that they could be influenced by.





School Production Disney's 'Beauty and the Beast'

The students have worked tirelessly to create a spectacular school production of Disney's 'Beauty and the Beast.' They have been rehearsing after school and weekends leading up to the show. All that hard work, dedication has really made a difference. The show was a huge success selling out on both nights. It was sensational! We are very lucky at Broadwater to have such amazing young talent. The spectacular performances from not only the principle characters but the ensemble too. A special shout out goes to the tech crew run by Charlie Lynch our incredible stage manager for amazing leadership and support to the crew. We're looking forward to start work on Broadwater's musical 2026 in September!























This term we also had the return of the *Surrey Festival of Musical Theatre and The Arts* in which we hosted. This was a fantastic opportunity for our performing arts and art students in which they showed off their talents on stage performing in an array of categories. Physical Education Summer Term

Dear Pupils, Parents, Guardians and the rest of the Broadwater Community,

PE and The Curriculum

We continue with our aim of nurturing physically literate pupils who, when they leave school, take the responsibility for their engagement in physical activity at a level which suits them.

"The Motivation, Confidence, Physical Competence, Knowledge and Understanding to value and take responsibility for engagement in physical activities for life"- IPLA 2017.

This half term has focussed on the Foundational Movement Skills, Interpersonal and Intra-personal skills, looking at Mindset and Understanding Physical Activity which has given pupils knowledge and understanding to take responsibility for their engagement in physical activity.

Our pupils have shown amazing enthusiasm for their physical activity at the level they choose. This has been shown throughout Sports Day, District Athletics, Rewards day and House Sport. PE is a subject that some pupils find very challenging due to the physical or ever changing environment but our pupils have embraced the "Let's just try" attitude which has benefited them in their progress in the subject and even grown confidence outside of PE.

Assessment

To assess this we split the 5 components of Physical Literacy into separate areas as shown below in a student friendly version (fig2). We then give a score out of 5 in each area and convert this to a percentage. This is what you as parents will see on the pupils' reports. We will identify areas and have those discussions with pupils. If a pupil is lacking motivation we can discuss with them why this could be and what we could do to change that. If it is confidence, we will discuss what aspect of the work, task or activity they are not confident with or is it they don't believe they have the physical skills to complete the task. Knowledge, we will see if they remember and have the declarative knowledge to be able to use that to use it as procedural knowledge and apply what they know in different

contexts. Physical Competence is a rating of have they mastered their FMS and can utilise them in different contexts.

As the diagram (fig 1) shows they are all interlinked and can lead to different behaviours. We will look to develop these over the year and each term they will have a new percentage and we will then give an average at the end of the year.






Duke of Edinburgh Award

School Attendance - Penalty Notice Update

The Government has introduced new regulations relating to attendance and penalty notices. These come into effect from 19th August 2024 and relate to penalty notices issued for unauthorised leave of absence.

The changes are as follows:

- 1. If a parent/carer has not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against the parent/carer in the Magistrates Court.
- 2. If a parent/carer has incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160, per parent/carer per child, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings in the Magistrates Court.
- 3. If a parent/carer has incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then the parent/carer will not receive a third penalty notice. Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, per parent/carer per child, in the Magistrates Court under section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

4th Place: Pegasus House


We also had two token counts and one praise point count which adds up to double points.
